A MESSAGE FROM THE VICAR

Happy New Year!

I am always a bit surprised at the energy that follows Christmas. One would expect that with all of the traveling, and gathering that occurs that we would all be out of commission until February! Perhaps that is the amazing thing about turning to a new calendar year. The idea of a fresh start does much to renew our energy levels and mental states. It is in this energy that we find ourselves wanting to set new resolutions or goals for our fresh start of the year.

Growing up my family would begin talking about our New Year's resolutions the day after Christmas day. It is estimated that nearly 60% of adults in the United States set New Year's resolutions. And while this tradition is predominately practiced in the Western Hemisphere, this tradition can be found throughout the world. In fact this year the Pope even made some suggestions.

These are Pope Francis' 10 resolutions for the New Year for the Vatican:

1. **Don't gossip.** *"Be careful how you speak, purify your tongue of offensive words, vulgarity and worldly decadence."*
2. **Don't be overrun with anger.** *"Watch out for anger that can lead to vengeance; for laziness that leads to existential euthanasia; for pointing the finger at others, which leads to pride; and for complaining continually, which leads to desperation."*
3. **Make time for others.** *"Take care of your family life, giving your children and loved ones not just money, but most of all your time, attention and love."*
4. **Choose the "more humble" purchase.** *"Making sure your Christmas is about Jesus and not about shopping."*
5. **Meet the poor "in the flesh."** *"Take care of brothers and sisters who are weaker ... the elderly, the sick, the hungry, the homeless and strangers, because we will be judged on this."*
6. **Stop judging others.** *"Be careful of envy, lust, hatred and negative feelings that devour our interior peace and transform us into destroyed and destructive people."*
7. **Befriend those who disagree.** *"Heal wounds of the heart with the oil of forgiveness, forgiving those who have hurt us and medicating the wounds we have caused others."*
8. **Make commitments, honor your commitments.** *"Take care of your relationships with others, transforming*

your faith into life and your words into good works, especially on behalf of the needy."

9. **Make it a habit to "ask the Lord."** *"Take care of your spiritual life, your relationship with God, because this is the backbone of everything we do and everything we are."*
10. **Find joy every day.** *"Look after your work, doing it with enthusiasm, humility, competence, passion and with a spirit that knows how to thank the Lord."*

These "resolutions" were posted to Facebook, and while I cannot verify that Pope Francis has stated his resolutions in this exact form, the quotes following each suggest that they are in line with what the Pope might offer as suggested resolutions for Christians.

Many of these seem logical and like something I am willing to attempt to make more of a regular practice in the coming year. But I think I might have a bit more trouble with #7?

In reality, befriending someone with whom I disagree might be the most Christ like thing I can do this year. Especially in an election year when debates become fiercely divisive and relationships are ruined by mere words. Is there reverence in the sanctuary?

Reverence is "a feeling or attitude of deep respect tinged with awe; veneration".^[1] The word "reverence" in the modern day is often used in relationship with [religion](#). This is because religion often stimulates the emotion through recognition of [God](#), the [supernatural](#), and the [ineffable](#). Reverence involves a humbling of the self in respectful recognition of something perceived to be greater than the self. Thus religion is commonly a place where reverence is felt.

Sanctuary is a word derived from the Latin *sanctuarium*, which is like most words ending in *-arium*, a container for keeping something in—in this case holy things or perhaps holy people, *sancta* or *sancti*. The meaning was extended to places of holiness or safety. A religious sanctuary may be a [sacred place](#) (such as a [church](#), [temple](#), [synagogue](#) or [mosque](#)), or a consecrated area of a church or temple around its tabernacle or [altar](#).

Reverence. Sanctuary. These two words are powerful and mean so much to a person who is preparing themselves for the Word of the Lord.

Do we as a congregation live up to those words? Are we respectful of others who are readying themselves for service? Is there reverence in the sanctuary?

There is a 10-15 minute window when the choir is done rehearsing and they file back into the choir room, that reverence in the sanctuary should be respected. A quiet time in the sanctuary for people to reflect, confess and have their time with God, without hearing other conversations happening in the sanctuary.

There is the Narthex and outside in front of the building for these conversations to take place. Or, wait until after service and have the conversations at fellowship. No conversation should take place as we walk through those white doors. The choir is also guilty of this as well. More conversations are held by the choir, just outside their room in the sanctuary rather than in their choir room.

The lack of reverence in the sanctuary is unacceptable. The sanctuary should be respected and revered. Walking past those big white doors and entering the sanctuary should be a safe place for people to settle down and prepare for service. The Pastor, Vicar and assistant ministers are in the Sacristy, before service, preparing themselves and no one seems to bother them. So shouldn't we show each other the same respect? Shouldn't we show God the same respect?

Let's put reverence back in the sanctuary!!!

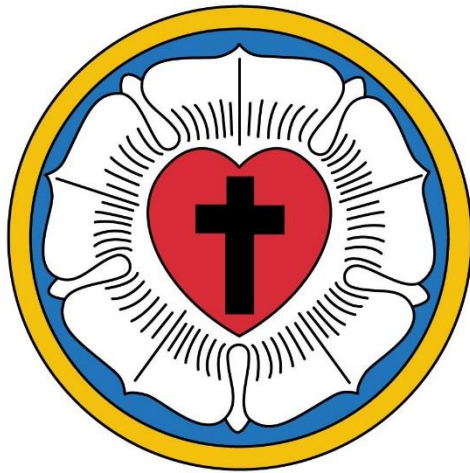
